Reference Design · technical review where site conditions require it. This Design Sheet supports early site, routine and material-system comparison. It is not a construction drawing set, specification, cut list, shopping list, structural calculation or engineering approval.

Planning Board



This board shows the relationship to preserve: rear enclosed shelter, forward mesh living area, rear wheels and front lifting handles. It is a reference design, not a construction drawing.

Move first

Prepare birds and loose items before lifting the front handles.

Park next

Choose a practical, reasonably level spot; do not treat the image as a terrain guarantee.

Recheck last

Confirm closures, access, feed and water after the position changes.

Plan the Route Before the Coop



A mobile direction is only useful when the actual yard supports the daily route and a repeatable place to park.

Route	Observe gates, turns, grass condition, obstacles and return trips.
Parking	Compare drainage, shade, weather exposure and useful service access.
Boundary	Do not infer towing, road transport, slope capacity or a fixed external run from this reference.

Keep the Bird Route Clear



The rear shelter supports nesting and roosting. Feed and water remain maintainable in the forward mesh area without blocking the internal route.

Rear service

Use the rear access for observation, nesting and roost-zone care.

Forward refill

Keep feed/water approachable after every move.

Routine

A fresh parking position still needs a closure and care check.

Compare Systems, Not Shopping Lists



These system categories are comparison prompts. They are not a materials order, quantity schedule or installation guide.

MOBILE SHELTER & WEATHER LAYER

Keeps the rear shelter useful for nesting, roosting and dry-day care while the site and exposure are reviewed.

MESH & PREDATOR INTERFACE

Defines the forward living area and its closable openings as a routinely inspected protection system.

HANDLING & MOVEMENT SYSTEM

Connects front handles, rear wheels, route conditions and the keeper's repeatable movement routine.

SERVICE & ACCESS HARDWARE

Keeps rear service access and forward refill/inspection access distinct and usable after each move.

DAILY-CARE FITTINGS

Keeps nesting and roosting inside the rear shelter, with feed and water accessible in the forward mesh area without blocking the bird route.

Common Problems to Plan For



Soft or uneven ground

Walk the route in real conditions. Mud, ruts and slopes change how a portable direction feels and where it can park.

Loose items before moving

Prepare birds, doors, latches, feed and water before lifting the front handles.

Weather and moisture exposure

Rear shelter coverage does not make the forward mesh area or a new parking spot universally dry or wind-free.

Gate and turn clearance

Check the actual route, turning moments and obstacles before assuming a place is reachable.

Closure check after parking

Recheck access points and latches after the position changes; movement can create a new daily-care setup.

Feed and water after the move

Confirm that refill access is useful and that care items do not block the internal bird route.

Move, Park and Recheck



01 Walk the route

Trace each proposed move on the real yard, including grass condition, tight spots, gates, turns and the return route.

02 Observe parking spots

Compare reasonably level ground, shade, drainage, weather exposure and enough space for service access.

03 Prepare the move

Use a consistent pre-move check for birds, loose items, access panels, latches, feed and water.

04 Move, park and recheck

Lift the front handles, roll on the rear wheels, park, then recheck closures and care access before calling the routine complete.

05 Prepare local-review questions

Ask about property rules, setbacks, site conditions and any locally applicable requirements before treating the placement as final.

Route and Parking Notes

Record what the real route reveals. These questions document observations; they do not prescribe a site design.

Route, gates, turns and obstacles

Ground condition, mud, ruts and drainage

Parking spots: level feel, shade and weather exposure

Pre-move and post-parking closure / feed / water routine

Local Review Checklist

Use this sheet to collect local questions. Final choices remain site- and product-specific.

- ☐ Property rules, setbacks and permits where applicable
- ☐ Site conditions, drainage and intended parking locations
- ☐ Weather exposure, ventilation and any local requirements
- ☐ Mesh, closures and routine inspection approach
- ☐ Final products and manufacturer requirements

QUESTIONS FOR LOCAL REVIEW

Record answers before treating placement, material, weather or operating assumptions as final.

Review the Movement Routine

This Design Sheet helps you compare a portable coop direction, test a real movement routine and prepare local questions. It does not provide construction drawings, structural calculations, a cut list or a shopping list.

KEEP

The rear enclosed shelter, forward mesh living area, rear wheels, front handles and a move-park-recheck routine.

CONFIRM LOCALLY

Route conditions, parking, weather exposure, product requirements and applicable rules.

THEN PROCEED

Use locally reviewed decisions to define the final construction or purchase scope.

FLOCK | Review both mobile zones

The 4 × 10 ft mobile reference includes rear shelter and forward mesh living space, with no fixed segment lengths. What bird-use and confinement conditions still need review?

Reference: p. 2 - Planning Board

Keeper: record actual birds and outdoor use. Local Extension: discuss housing conditions that remain unclear.

SITE | A moveable form needs a real route

Record gates, soft ground, uneven sections and proposed parking locations. Can the intended movement routine be assessed without assuming weight, lifting effort or handling safety?

Reference: p. 3 - Plan the Route Before the Coop

Keeper: observe the site safely. Local authority: confirm use and setbacks. A suitable site professional: assess drainage or support changes.

ROUTINE | Check after each proposed move

How will you inspect the rear shelter, refill the forward area and keep the internal bird route clear? List the access, latch, feed and water checks needed after parking.

Reference: p. 4 - Keep the Bird Route Clear

Keeper: walk the care route and record reach, cleaning and access conflicts; an experienced keeper or local Extension can help review the routine.

WEATHER | Exposure changes with parking

What changes in shade, wind, ground gaps and water access between parking spots? The wheels and handles are not proof of safe handling or engineered wind performance.

Reference: p. 6 - Common Problems to Plan For

Keeper: record exposure and openings. A qualified local professional: review proposed roof, support or anchoring changes; an electrician handles electrical work.

BUDGET | Include the movement system

Which handling, access, weather-shell and maintenance costs need local review? Include route work and recurring care; the reference does not supply a wheel specification or priced BOM.

Reference: p. 5 - Compare Systems, Not Shopping Lists

Keeper: list all scope and unknowns. Suppliers: provide dated quotes. Appropriate local professionals: define any site-specific design or service work.
