KEY PLAN FACTS

12 × 8 ft overall

Left: enclosed, full-height coop
Right: attached open-air mesh run
Gable roof covers the coop only

ACCESS & DAILY ROUTINE

Two independent front entries

Coop door: cleaning, tools, bedding
Run gate: feed, water, observation
Keep the shared pop route clear

WHAT TO CONFIRM LOCALLY

Site drainage and low spots

Rain, wind, shade and exposure
Support, anchoring and climate loads
Setbacks, permits and local rules
Final roof / weather protection choices

01 · WHAT MAKES THIS PLAN DISTINCT

Walk in, observe, clean.

A full-height coop gives a dedicated human care route, separate from the attached run.
Plan nesting and high, dry roosting inside;
keep feed and water in or near the run.

02 · PLAN THE ROUTES BEFORE MATERIALS

Human access ≠ bird access

Use the front coop door for cleaning and inspection. Use the front run gate for daily care. Chickens use the partition pop opening.

03 · IMPORTANT BOUNDARY

A planning reference, not a build set.

This board helps you compare relationships, daily care and site questions. Final structure, supports and local decisions require review.

This board communicates the footprint, access and care relationships. It is not a construction drawing or a site-specific specification.

THE NON-NEGOTIABLE RELATIONSHIP

The enclosed full-height coop is on the left. The attached run is on the right and intentionally remains open-air mesh. The gable roof protects the enclosed coop only.

Choose the Site Around the Routine



FIXED FOOTPRINT

The fixed footprint asks for more yard commitment and site review than a compact or mobile direction. The attached run is open-air, so shade, wind, rain exposure and ground conditions remain site-specific decisions.

TWO HUMAN ROUTES

Keep the full-height coop door useful for cleaning and supplies, and the separate run gate useful for feed, water and observation.

WEATHER AND GROUND

Observe runoff, low spots, sun, shade, wind and the route that people use before committing to a location.

Walk In, Observe and Clean



Standing aisle

Keep the human route clear for bedding, inspection and collection.

Care zones

Keep nesting and high dry roosting inside the enclosed coop.

Bird route

Keep the shared pop-opening path free. Feed and water sit in the run or at low-spill run access, not in the aisle.

ROUTINE TEST

If cleaning, feed/water, nesting and the bird route compete for the same narrow area, revise the planning relationship before selecting final fittings.

Compare Systems, Not Shopping Lists



Use these categories to compare purpose, local conditions, maintenance and budget prompts. This is not a purchase order, quantity schedule or installation guide.

Ground & support interface	Enclosed coop floor & weather layer
Gable roof weather layer	Open-air run mesh & opening protection
Human & run access system	Nesting, roosting & daily-care fittings

Common Problems to Plan For



Runoff and low spots

Observe water movement around the fixed overall footprint before choosing support, ground and routine details.

Open-air run exposure

The run has airflow and visibility but remains exposed to local rain, wind, shade and ground conditions.

Blocked human route

Keep the full-height coop entry and standing aisle available for tools, bedding removal and inspection.

Blocked bird route

Keep feed, water and care items clear of the shared pop-opening route.

Damp bedding

Use the care routine to notice moisture early instead of treating enclosure materials as a universal fix.

Opening and closure checks

Treat coop door, run gate, mesh edges and bird opening as one regular inspection routine.

Start With the Site, Not a Materials Order



01 Mark the overall relationship

Lay out the 12 by 8 foot overall reference, then distinguish the left enclosed coop from the right open-air run.

02 Walk the two human routes

Test the front coop-door path for cleaning and supplies, then the front run-gate path for feed, water and observation.

03 Observe weather and ground

Record rain exposure, runoff, low spots, sun, shade and wind before selecting systems or committing to a location.

04 Test care-zone reach

Make sure nesting, roosting, bedding and run-side feed/water care do not block the aisle or pop opening.

05 Prepare local-review questions

Ask about site support, anchoring, roof/weather details, drainage, climate loads, setbacks and local rules.

Site Observation Sheet

Write down what you observe at the actual site. These prompts capture decisions; they do not prescribe a site design.

Runoff, low spots and ground condition

Sun, shade and prevailing weather

Coop-door and run-gate approach routes

Questions for support, anchoring and local rules

Use this sheet to prepare questions for the appropriate local reviewer. Final decisions remain site-specific.

QUESTIONS FOR LOCAL REVIEW

Record answers and assumptions before treating any material, support or weather decision as final.

Questions to Resolve Before Proceeding

This Design Sheet helps you compare a Walk-In direction, establish the daily routine and prepare for a locally reviewed design. It does not provide construction drawings, structural calculations, a cut list or a shopping list.

KEEP

The left enclosed-coop / right open-air-run relationship, distinct human routes and a clear care routine.

CONFIRM LOCALLY

Site support, drainage, anchoring, weather, climate loads, product requirements and local rules.

THEN PROCEED

Turn the locally reviewed decisions into the final construction scope and material order.

FLOCK | Keep the open-air run distinct

The 12 × 8 ft overall reference combines a left 6 × 8 ft enclosed coop with a right 6 × 8 ft open-air mesh run. What happens to usable space during confinement?

Reference: p. 2 - Planning Board

Keeper: record actual birds and outdoor use. Local Extension: discuss housing conditions that remain unclear.

SITE | Allow two front approaches

Observe the fixed footprint, front coop door and independent front run gate. Where do tools, bedding and rainwater travel?

Reference: p. 3 - Choose the Site Around the Routine

Keeper: observe the site safely. Local authority: confirm use and setbacks. A suitable site professional: assess drainage or support changes.

ROUTINE | Preserve the standing aisle

Can you walk in, inspect and clean without blocking the shared bird opening? Check nesting and roost access, with feed and water in the run or low-spill run access.

Reference: p. 4 - Walk In, Observe and Clean

Keeper: walk the care route and record reach, cleaning and access conflicts; an experienced keeper or local Extension can help review the routine.

YOUR FIVE PLANNING QUESTIONS

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WEATHER | Plan for an unroofed run

The approved roof covers the coop only. What shade, rain, wind and ground conditions need attention in the open-air run? Any extra cover is a separate site-specific review.

Reference: p. 6 - Common Problems to Plan For

Keeper: record exposure and openings. A qualified local professional: review proposed roof, support or anchoring changes; an electrician handles electrical work.

BUDGET | Do not assume an included run roof

Price coop and mesh-run systems, site work and care separately. If you are considering extra shade or cover, record its unreviewed scope rather than treating it as an included assembly.

Keeper: list all scope and unknowns. Suppliers: provide dated quotes. Appropriate local professionals: define any site-specific design or service work.
